### What is the weirdest random job you've ever done?

Being Ronald McDonald's Bodyguard. I would walk with him in parades, and was responsible for setting

up and running the school shows we did.

#### What is your favourite random job?

Mystery Shopping! That's where you get to pretend like you're a customer and get paid to evaluate customer service. I've been doing it since 1999 and have worked for over 150 companies in 8 states and two provinces. Most people think of mystery shoppers just evaluating restaurants and retail stores, but every industry gets shopped. My favourite assignments are for apartments and banks.

## What types of things can people do to make money from home?

People tend to think of "working from home" as a career. It's not. In order to work from home, you neto take your current skill-set and translate that into a home-work environment, not an office. So, when people ask, "What work can you do at home?" I always answer, "Well, what can you do?" In my book break it down by skill set and expertise. For example: If you speak multiple languages, you can teach, tutor, or translate. If you have a background in education, you can tutor, score standardized tests, or give test training. If you have technical skills, there are a ton of sites where you can find freelance work. If have basic computer skills, there are companies who will hire you to be a virtual assistant. It really just depends on you, what you know how to do (or are willing to learn) and your interests. That's why I off over 300 legitimate companies and resources...there's something in there for nearly every background

# So, is it possible to work at home and not get scammed?

Absolutely! It's a matter of knowing where the job offer is coming from and researching the company thoroughly. That's why I teach people the marketing tricks of scammers and basic technical Internet information (like how to trace emails and track IP addresses) so they can dig deeper into the company. rather than just accepting what they're told at face value.

# What is the best advice you never got?

"Fail Forward Fast." As an entrepreneur, you're going to make mistakes...you just are. So, you might as well get it over with so you can start having success!

#### What is the one thing that you did right?

Trust my gut that what I was doing was worthwhile and needed. And also, as an author you learn quickly that writing the book and getting it published really is the easy part. It's the marketing and support afterwards that takes the majority of your time and effort.

#### What is the one thing that you did wrong?

I don't think I could limit it to just one thing! For me personally, there was a time when I tried to start six businesses at one....that wasn't too wise. I learned that desperation is never good for cash-flow. I think if I had to do it over, I would have picked one area to focus on before moving on to something else. And I would have started writing my book and writing for my blog much, much sooner and with more consistency.

### What advice would you offer other authors?

No one else is going to love your book and your business as much as you are. You can consult with others, you can hire others to help you with marketing and PR, but YOU are the best spokesperson for

what you've created. Don't leave the success of your book or business in someone else's hands. Take an active role in each aspect of creation, marketing, and publicity.

# What book(s) have you read that you would recommend to others?

Two that I regularly read are, *Feel the Fear and Do it Anyway*, and *Rich Dad/Poor Dad*. I devour any kind of business book and I'm a frequent patron of my library.
